## Loyola's Civil Justice Program Presents "Injuries without Remedies"

**Los Angeles** – The Civil Justice Program at Loyola Law School will host a daylong exploration of the evolving phenomenon of "Injuries without Remedies" on Friday, March 26 from 8:45 a.m.-5 p.m. Top civil law professors from more than two dozen law schools are scheduled to participate. The symposium will be held in Robinson Courtroom, the flagship Frank Gehry-designed courtroom on Loyola's downtown L.A. campus.

"Many people assume that what law defines as an 'injury' is constant over time. However, neither 'injury' nor 'remedies' are static but changing in meaning and content over time. For instance, emotional distress, spousal abuse and privacy actions are new; we've abolished alienation of affections and breach of promise to marry," said Professor John Nockleby, CJP director. "The symposium features leading scholars thinking hard about what counts as 'injury,' as well as the symbiotic relationship between injury and remedy."
